Recovery During Hurricane Season Brings Fear, Anxiety FISH Provides Assistance & Support



With the recent news of the earliest Atlantic Category 5 hurricane on record and the offshore passing of Tropical Storm Debby, anxiety is heightened on the islands, even though its path spared the community.

Anxiety during hurricane season, particularly as recovery from lan continues, is a reality for many.

For some, it's the darkening skies or the roar of the winds that triggers fear. For others, it's the anticipation and uncertainty about what might happen to them or their family, particularly if they are lan disaster survivors still struggling nearly two years later.

Despite these fears, island residents and the workforce continue their attempts to move forward.

Individuals seeking long-term recovery assistance are identified through FISH's canvassing efforts, outreach phone calls, referrals, and those already known to FISH. Among them is Jennifer Powers, an island employee who is grateful for the support from FISH. "I just wanted to take a minute to express my absolute gratitude to the FISH organization, their volunteers, and contributors. I lost everything in the past hurricane except the car I escaped in and my dog," expressed Powers in a heartfelt letter to the organization, noting she spent over a year living in her car and moving from couch to couch while trying to find a job without an address. The name of the individual has been changed for privacy purposes.

After Hurricane Ian, Powers was left unhoused and jobless. She applied, re-applied, and worked with assistance programs, including homeless advocates and disaster program caseworkers, but still struggled to find appropriate assistance. "While these other programs tried to help, the timing and constant shifting of caseworkers made it quite challenging to get any results. FISH was able to help me quickly and responsively in the last few months," notes Powers.

Immediately following the hurricane, Powers picked up day jobs but nothing consistent. "It was hard," she recalls. "My self-esteem was low, I had no place to live, and little money to buy groceries or gas. I tried to stick it out as long as I could, but living in your car or rotating stays at friends' houses for over a year takes a toll on you." <u>Continue reading on our blog.</u>

The Long-Term Recovery program is available to island residents and full-time workers, offering limited financial assistance for repair costs directly related to Hurricane Ian. Applications can be obtained from FISH's website or its Sanibel location, and documentation with an initial intake session with Disaster Case Manager, Nitza Lopez, is required.

We Are Now Referring Furniture Donations to Noah's

As Noah's Ark Thrift Shop-St. Michael and All Angels has recently started accepting donations, we are redirecting furniture and household item donations to Noah's.

As we clear out our facility for upcoming repairs, we are no longer able to accept furniture and household donations. "We're absolutely thrilled that Noah's is back accepting donations," says Maria Espinoza, Executive Director of FISH. "FISH was happy to fill the gap by providing community members with furnishings while Noah's recovered from Hurricane Ian. Now that they are accepting donations, we encourage community members to bring their items to the Ark, located behind St. Michael and All Angels Church at 2304 Periwinkle." FISH notes that donors can call FISH regarding larger furniture and appliance donations.

According to Noah's social media pages, furniture donations should be small items that folks can bring to the Ark. They do not have pick-up service at this time. Some of the items needed include the following - clothes in good condition; décor items, artwork and lamps; books, DVDs, Puzzles, games, holiday decorations; small appliances (toasters, blenders, food processors); etc.

Larger items, such as light fixtures and ceiling fans, sleeper sofas, large exercise equipment, building equipment, appliances, etc. are better taken to another thrift store, or contact FISH at 239-472-4775 to see if we can accept. Sanibel will welcome runners from across the globe on Saturday, December 7th for our 10K/5K race, a highlight of the JOG N JAM fundraising event. Last year, the race drew 530 participants, with a majority from Florida and others from various U.S. states, Germany, and the United Kingdom.

Louise Rushmer, a recent registrant, will join the 10K runners in her first U.S. race. "I'm excited to participate in the 10K event. Sanibel is my favorite place—I honeymooned there when my uncle had a place on

the island," says Louise, who visits when she can to see her cousin who also has a home on Sanibel.

A dedicated runner for 20 years, Louise adds, "Supporting the rebuilding of our paradise island while doing something I love is wonderful. I've never raced in the U.S., so I'm very excited! I recently ran our village 10K in Horndon on the Hill, east of London, in 52 minutes, the same time as 20 years ago. Now at 58, I'm quite pleased with that time." Horndon on the Hill is a quaint village in Thurrock, Essex, England, known for its blend of charm and history.

FACING IMPOSSIBLE CHOICES

"No one should go to bed hungry. Not one child. Not one parent. Not one senior. At FISH, we're working hard to make sure every person has enough to eat and never faces an impossible choice."

Food is life. But the cost of feeding a family can lead to immense consequences. Financial hardship and hunger are closely linked. Hunger leads to poor health, poor performance at work and poor performance at school. *Yet, in our community, a single parent with a school-age child and working full-time can spend nearly a quarter of their paycheck on food alone.* One unexpected expense can lead to impossible choices.

FISH continues to fight food insecurity with programs including Meals-by-FISH, which delivers hot meals to shut-ins, and the Backpack Program which helps feed kids during weekends and school breaks. **During 2023, the Food Pantry also hosted 5,486 visits. Holiday Food Baskets went to 896 families.**

These programs depend on the generosity of food banks, local grocers, food drives and financial support.


