# **FISH Awarded \$6.9 Million in CDBG-DR Grant Funding**



FISH of Sanibel-Captiva (FISH) is thrilled to announce that they have been awarded \$6,990,194.00 in Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG-DR) funding in cooperation with the City of Sanibel.

This vital federal funding will cover much of the costs required to repair and rebuild FISH facilities, which sustained significant damage during Hurricane Ian.

With this generous capital grant funding, FISH will be able to repair and rebuild their facilities that support all community programs. It will allow the organization to continue providing essential services to the Sanibel and Captiva communities while also building back better to ensure future resilience.

The organization is deeply grateful for the partnership with the City of Sanibel and the support of the Lee County Commissioners, who have recognized the critical needs of the local community through this award.

"We are overwhelmingly thankful for this funding, which allows us to address the damage to our facilities and enhance our ability to serve our neighbors," said Maria Espinoza, Executive Director of FISH. "Our heartfelt thanks go out to the City of Sanibel, Lee County Commissioners, and everyone involved in recognizing and supporting our community's recovery needs. We are excited to begin our repairs and remain committed to serving our community today and in the future."

FISH plans to reveal detailed plans for the repair and rebuilding process to stakeholders in the near future. The organization is eager to begin this new chapter and continue to be a beacon of hope and support for the residents and workforce of Sanibel and Captiva Islands.

The cost of feeding a family can lead to immense consequences. According to finding in the Feeding America Meal Gap, Lee County and 2023 ALICE Report, Lee County, a single parent with a school-age child and working full-time can spend nearly a quarter of their paycheck on food alone.

The FISH Food Pantry serves as a lifeline for families and individuals struggling to make ends meet. FISH offers a "choice pantry," allowing clients to select the items they need, ensuring that nothing goes to waste and dietary needs and preferences are met. Beyond providing nutritious food, the pantry also supplies essential personal hygiene products, paper goods, and pet care items, recognizing that basic needs extend beyond food alone.


Available to all Lee County residents, the FISH Food Pantry is open Monday-Wednesday-Friday from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM and Tuesday & Thursday from 10:00 AM to 7:30 PM. To participate, clients are asked to provide basic information such as proof of residency and household size. Last year, FISH welcomed 5,486 visits to their Food Pantry, making a notable difference in the lives of those facing financial hardship.

In these challenging times, when so many are forced to make difficult choices, FISH is proud to offer support and relief. # ood is life no one should go without

Food is life. But the cost of feeding a family can lead to immense consequences. Financial hardship and hunger are closely linked. Hunger leads to poor health, poor performance at work and poor performance at school. Yet, in our community, a single parent with a school-age child and working full-time can spend nearly a quarter of their paycheck on food alone. One unexpected expense can lead to impossible choices.

FISH continues to fight food insecurity with programs including Meals-by-FISH, which delivers hot meals to shut-ins, and the Backpack Program which helps feed kids during weekends and school breaks. During 2023, the Food Pantry also hosted 5,486 visits. Holiday Food Baskets went to 896 families.

These programs depend on the generosity of food banks, local grocers, food drives and financial support.
