## SUPPORTING LOCAL CHILDREN ALL YEAR LONG



With the new school year underway, we are reminding the community about its year-round youth programs designed to support children who live on Sanibel and Captiva—or whose parents work on the islands. From school supplies and food assistance to after-school scholarships and specialty program support, FISH helps families manage rising costs while making sure kids have what they need to grow, learn, and thrive.

"Back-to-school can be financially overwhelming," says Merari Salinas, FISH Community Outreach Manager. "But when families know they have support, it eases the overwhelm. This August, many children received brand-new backpacks filled with grade-level school supplies during the FISH Back-to-School event. Families also picked up

essentials like clothing items and —items that aren't always affordable after paying rent, utilities, and groceries.

For one local mom, Rhonda, the school supplies came just in time. "I was worried about how I was going to afford everything for my two kids. Things like folders and markers seem small until you're buying them for two kids on top of rent and car insurance," she shares. "Getting the backpacks from FISH meant they didn't feel different from the other kids. They were excited to start school, not embarrassed. That means everything to a parent."

This year, FISH collected school supplies for students in grades K-12 through the support of several generous community drop-off locations. Donation sites included the Sanibel Public Library, Chocolattes in Fort Myers, Jerry's Foods, Sanibel Captiva Community Bank (Sanibel branches), Adventures in Paradise Outfitters to the Outsiders, Macintosh Books + Paper, Sanibel Captiva Trust Company, Sanibel Community Church, and the Sanibel & Captiva Islands Association of Realtors.



"We're so grateful for the incredible community support that makes this program possible," says Maria Espinoza, Executive Director of FISH. The organization offered a very special thanks to Saint Michael and All Angels Episcopal Church who provided venue space, Quantum Fiber who provided free snow cones and additional supplies and the many FISH volunteers who organized and helped distribute items. "So many supporters step up each year," said Espinoza. "This is truly a community effort."

Beyond school supplies, many families also depend on FISH's **Youth Scholarship Program**, which helps cover the cost of after-school care while she works full time. "There's just no way I could afford after-school care without help," Rhonda continues. "My youngest is in second grade, and I need to know he's safe until I get off work. FISH helped with that, and it's been life-changing." For additional information on the youth scholarship program, please contact Nitza Lopez, Social Services Director at FISH.

The FISH **Backpack Program** is another critical support, providing children with weekend meals and snacks when school cafeterias are closed. With easy-to-prepare foods that children can manage themselves, the program helps reduce hunger and promote better focus and health. "Good nutrition plays a big role in academic performance," says Salinas. "We're not just handing out food—we're supporting their learning, their confidence, and their future."

FISH youth programs are open to families who live on Sanibel or Captiva or who have a parent employed on the islands. Each program is tailored to meet a child's unique needs, from school-year help to summer enrichment. "We see families from all walks of life—single parents, working families, grandparents raising grandkids," adds Espinoza. "No matter what your situation looks like, FISH is here to listen and provide support." Families who could benefit from youth scholarships, after-school support, weekend food bags, or other assistance are encouraged to reach out to the FISH team.

## HONORING OLDER ADULTS | NATIONAL SENIOR DAY



In honor of National Senior Citizens Day on August 21, we are celebrating the contributions of older adults in the Sanibel and Captiva communities. "Seniors bring so much heart, history, and strength to our islands," says Erika Arnowitz, FISH Senior Services Director. "They've given so much to this community, and it's our privilege to make sure they feel valued and supported—not just on National Senior Citizens Day, but all year long."

To mark the occasion, FISH will be acknowledging local seniors with a small token of appreciation to say "thank you" for all they've done and continue to do. FISH's year-round Senior Services programs are designed to help older adults remain safe, independent, and connected. These services include, but are not limited to:

- Well-Check Calls & Home Visits – Friendly outreach to ensure seniors are safe, supported, and not feeling alone.
- Smile Boxes – Delivered monthly, filled with useful and cheerful items to brighten someone's day.
- Financial Assistance – Help with rent, utilities, medical bills, and other essential expenses.
- Meals by FISH – A Meals-on-Wheels-style program offering fresh, home-delivered meals.
- Friendly Faces Luncheon – Monthly gatherings that offer food, socialization, and fun—at no cost.
- Medical Equipment Loan Program – Access to items like walkers, wheelchairs, and more, all at no cost.
- Hurricane Preparedness Support – Assistance with storm planning, emergency kits, and post-storm check-ins.
- Transportation Services – Volunteer-driven rides to essential appointments such as non-emergency medical visits, pharmacy trips, and errands for daily essentials.
- Food Pantry Access – Nutritious groceries available to all, with delivery for those unable to leave home.

Though most of these programs are available to all ages, many seniors rely on them due to fixed incomes or limited mobility. These senior programs are made possible thanks to the support of many, including senior-specific funding from CAMEO of Lee County, the Shady Rest Foundation, Comcast Business, and generous private donors who share FISH's commitment to helping older adults thrive. FISH also partners with the Santiva Islanders to offer enriching activities like group outings, educational sessions, arts and crafts, and health and wellness classes.

Local resident Ruth M., age 84, shared, "FISH has been with me through it all—after my surgery, during hurricane season, and even just when I needed someone to talk to. The Friendly Faces luncheon is my favorite day of the month!" As we honor National Senior Citizens Day, FISH encourages everyone to check in with the older adults in their lives—and in their neighborhoods. ## FISH HELPS NEIGHBORS WEATHER LIFE'S STORMS



When hurricanes come and go, the damage they leave behind can stay long after the skies clear. For residents like "Linda," the road to recovery has been long and uncertain. Thanks to the Helping Hands Emergency Financial Assistance Rent Program at FISH OF SANCAP — funded by a generous grant from The Sanctuary Golf Club Foundation — hope found its way back into Linda's life at a time she needed it most.

After suffering near-total damage to her Sanibel home from Hurricane Ian and then facing new setbacks after Hurricane Milton, Linda and her partner, who is battling advanced cancer, found themselves displaced

once again. Living in hotels with their pets, juggling mounting expenses on credit cards, and jumping through insurance hurdles left them emotionally and financially drained.

That's when Linda turned to FISH, an organization she knew had always been there for the community. Sitting down with the FISH team, she received not only two months of mortgage help to ease the financial strain, but also the comfort of knowing someone truly cared and was there to listen.

"The weight that was lifted from me was far beyond the financial," Linda shared. "The FISH team listened to my story. They provided emotional support at a time I needed it most. I left their relief center with a sense of strength I hadn't felt in a long time."

Linda's story is just one example of the many lives touched by FISH's quiet but powerful presence on Sanibel and Captiva. Through programs like Helping Hands, FISH assists neighbors through some of life's hardest moments — whether facing job loss, serious illness, or the aftermath of a storm.

"We're grateful to The Sanctuary Golf Club Foundation for helping make this program possible," said Maria Espinoza, Executive Director of FISH. "It's because of their generosity that we can continue to be a lifeline to our neighbors when they're at their most vulnerable."

No matter what challenges come — from storms to rising costs — FISH is here. Programs like Helping Hands allow FISH to offer help and a reminder that no one has to face hard times alone.

FISH's Helping Hands Program provides emergency financial assistance for a variety of needs — from rent or mortgage payments to utilities, medical or dental expenses, and other urgent situations. Each request is carefully reviewed, ensuring individuals and families receive the right support at the right time. ## HOMESAFE PROGRAM PORTAL IS OPEN



My Safe FL Home (MSFH) applications have opened! The Florida Legislature has allocated \$280 million for the 2025–2026 fiscal year to fund new Wind-mitigation Inspections and Grants under the MSFH Program.

Grants are for WIND Mitigation upgrades only—Funding is limited and grants are awarded on a first come, first served basis. We strongly encourage eligible homeowners to complete their applications as early as possible to maximize their chances.

**What is the My Safe Florida Home Program?** | The My Safe Florida Home Program (My Safe FL Home), re-established during the 2022 Special Session of the Florida Legislature, offers financial assistance to eligible Florida homeowners to help retrofit and strengthen homes against storm damage. The program has two (2) main components, both administered by the Florida Department of Financial Services (DFS):

- To provide eligible Florida homeowners with a free, no-obligation Hurricane Mitigation Inspection, which will assess the current hurricane-resistant features of their home and recommend improvements to further strengthen their home against hurricanes.
- To offer eligible Florida homeowners a Hurricane Mitigation Grant to help cover the cost of recommended home improvements identified during the program's initial inspection, enhancing the home's hurricane resistance and potentially qualifying the homeowner for discounts on home insurance premiums.

**Matching Grants** | The MSFH Program Matching Grant works on a reimbursement basis. Your Grant Application must be approved prior to proceeding with construction work. Payment requests are made at the end of the application process through a Draw Request. You must provide a paid-in-full invoice with your Draw Request. If your Draw Request is approved, you will be reimbursed for 2/3 of the total costs of the construction project up to a maximum state contribution of up to \$10,000, subject to legislative appropriation.

**Low-Income Grants** | Low-Income Homeowners who meet all other Hurricane Mitigation Grant Requirements are eligible for a Low-Income Grant of up to \$10,000, subject to legislative appropriation, and are not required to provide a matching amount to receive grant funds. Low-Income Homeowners do not need to provide a paid-in-full invoice and are exempt from the insured value requirement.

## ADULT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM HELPS NEIGHBORS

For many, the road to stability and self-sufficiency isn't a straight line. Whether it's recovering from a storm, trying to advance in a career, or simply seeking a fresh start, education can make all the difference. FISH OF SANCAP's Adult Scholarship Program is here to help make that possible.

Through the program, FISH assists with tuition, books, and necessary supplies—removing some of the financial barriers that often make returning to school feel out of reach. The program is funded in part by the Zonta Foundation of Southwest Florida and is available to residents and workers on Sanibel and Captiva who are looking to improve their job prospects and long-term stability.

"We've seen how continuing education truly opens new doors," says Nitza Lopez, Social Services Director, who supports individuals looking to further their education. "This program is especially important for under-employed adults who are juggling work, family, and financial challenges. A little support can go a long way in helping someone move forward."

That's certainly true for one Sanibel resident, a married mom with a young child who lost her job after Hurricane Ian. "We were trying to survive on one income and pay \$2,500 in rent," she shared. After finally finding a more affordable apartment, she landed a full-time job and was eager to learn new skills. "I applied to a certificate program that could help me move up at work," she said. FISH stepped in to help, covering a portion of the cost. "That support meant everything. I feel hopeful that we'll be able to save for the future and be in a better position long-term."

FISH also supported a young woman while she pursues a degree in Nursing at Florida State University. "I am truly honored, this support means so much to me and will significantly help ease the financial burden of my education. Now I can focus more on my studies and continue working toward my goals without as much financial stress."


In addition to financial support, FISH helps each participant access the services they need—like food from the pantry—so they can focus on work, class, and studying.
