The holidays are meant to be a joyous, magical time, but for many families in our community, the season can bring added stress and uncertainty. FISH of SanCap has launched its annual Holiday Adopt-A-Family Program, spreading kindness and hope by helping local families who are struggling financially celebrate the holidays with dignity and joy.

This year, FISH has identified 150 families in need of adoption through the program. The Adopt-A-Family program ensures personalized support for families who might otherwise go without during the holiday season. Donors can make the season special by adopting an entire family and donating items they request from their wish lists.

All gifts must be new and may be dropped off wrapped or unwrapped by December 15 at the FISH Palm Ridge location. Early drop-offs are welcome at the FISH office at 2422 Periwinkle Way.

"The holidays can be especially hard for families already struggling to make ends meet," says Merari Salinas, Food Programs Manager at FISH of SanCap. "Something as simple as a new toy, clothing, or a special gift can lift a child's spirits and remind parents that they're not alone. Every donation helps bring back a little joy and hope during what can otherwise be a very difficult season."

For many, the support from this program is deeply personal. A single mother of three who received gifts through the Adopt-A-Family Program last year shared, "I'll never forget seeing my kids' faces light up when they opened their presents. I didn't know how I was going to make Christmas happen that year, but FISH—and the people who donated—gave us more than gifts. They gave us memories and reminded me that our community truly cares."

Rising costs for housing, groceries, and basic needs continue to stretch family budgets across Lee County. Many working parents, seniors, and individuals are still recovering from economic challenges brought on by the hurricanes and the slow rebuilding process. The Adopt-A-Family Program helps ensure that even during tough times, children wake up to the excitement of the holidays and families can share in the warmth of the season (*continued on next page*)



Community Support Helps FISH Keep Pantry Shelves Stocked Amid SNAP Uncertainty

Following our recent urgent plea regarding the uncertainty surrounding federal SNAP benefits, the organization is sharing a hopeful update: thanks to a generous grant from the Sanctuary Golf Club Foundation, the FISH Food Pantry has been able to stay well-stocked and ready to support island workers and residents who are feeling the strain.

“The Sanctuary Foundation is proud to support those individuals in need of assistance living and working on our islands,” said Lisa Schmidlin, President of the Sanctuary Golf Club. The Foundation has long supported FISH through its charitable giving, and this particular grant arrived at a moment when the community truly needed it.



Food insecurity continues to be a real challenge in Lee County, where many families live paycheck to paycheck and unexpected expenses—whether storm repairs, healthcare needs, or rising grocery prices—can quickly throw things off balance. On Sanibel and Captiva, those who live or work on the islands often face even higher costs for basic necessities.

“We’re seeing more neighbors coming to us worried about what the next few weeks will look like,” said Maria Espinoza, Executive Director of FISH. “This grant from the Sanctuary Golf Club Foundation couldn’t have come at a better time. Their support helps us keep our shelves full so families don’t have to choose between groceries and other essentials. The Foundation has been a steady supporter of FISH programs over the years, and we’re incredibly grateful for their continued kindness.”

FISH also extends its gratitude to all donors who responded to the recent urgent plea for assistance, as well as SCCF, the SanCap Resilience Steering Committee, and others who helped share the message throughout their networks. FISH will continue monitoring the SNAP situation closely while preparing for the possibility of a prolonged increase in need.

As reported on Nov. 18 by ABC News, “Just as SNAP benefits were reinstated for millions of Americans following the reopening of the federal government, many are now set to permanently lose them. According to Congressional Budget Office (CBO) estimates, about 1.1 million people will lose SNAP benefits between 2025 and 2034, including 800,000 able-bodied adults through age 64 who don’t live with dependents and 300,000 parents or caregivers up to age 64 with children aged 14 and older.”

“I think millions of people are going to lose food. ... There’s no question this is going to create more harm and suffering and hunger,” Joel Berg, CEO of the nonprofit hunger relief organization Hunger Free America, told ABC News. [Continue reading on our blog.](#)

Gearing Up For Season With Updated Hours

As we prepare for a busy season, we are ready to welcome residents, seasonal visitors, and volunteers with open arms—and updated hours designed to make services even more accessible. The FISH office will be open Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. During those hours, neighbors can drop off donations, request services, or connect with staff about programs.

Food Programs, led by Merari Salinas, Food Programs Manager, continue to meet the growing needs of island families through the food pantry, youth food backpack program and holiday meal basket program. **The Island-Based Education pillar, under the direction of Simon Robson, Community Outreach & Resiliency Director**, helps to keep residents and the workforce informed through community workshops and educational sessions. New workshops are in development for the rest of this year and into 2026, covering topics like self-defense, financial safety and personal wellness.

Senior Services, directed by Erika Arnowitz, continues to grow with expanded social opportunities and community outings. Thanks to new partnerships, including with the Santiva Islanders, seniors can look forward to enhanced programs that promote connection, engagement, and fun—while addressing topics such as aging in place. **Through the Helping Hands pillar, Social Services Director Nitza Lopez** provides emergency financial assistance, continuing education for adults, and scholarships for children. These programs help families get back on their feet after unexpected challenges and build toward long-term stability. The **FISH Food Pantry**—a vital part of its mission—extends its Tuesday hours to better accommodate working families and individuals who cannot visit during the day. Pantry hours are below. Healthy Smiles Ahead! FISH Hosts Oral Health Outreach Day



We invite the community to a special Oral Health Outreach Day on **Tuesday, December 16, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the FISH Food Pantry, 2422 Periwinkle Way, Sanibel.**

The event, facilitated by Project Dentists Care (PDC), offers free information about dental hygiene, preventive care, and the no-cost dental services available through their Fort Myers clinic for patients earning below 200% of the federal poverty level.

Guests are welcome to drop by anytime during the event—no RSVP is needed—to chat with PDC representatives and learn about the services they provide, including emergency dentistry, extractions, fillings, dentures and partials, and more.

Every adult visitor will receive a complimentary oral healthcare gift bag, and parents can also pick up one for their children.

“Oral health plays such an important role in overall well-being, yet too many people delay care due to cost or lack of access,” says Simon Robson, Community Outreach & Resiliency Director at FISH of SanCap. “We’re grateful to Project Dentists Care for bringing their information and compassion to our neighbors. Events like this make it easier for families to learn ways to stay healthy.”

Project Dentists Care is a volunteer-based program that provides basic dental care—including cleanings, exams, fillings, and emergency services—to underserved individuals throughout Lee County. By connecting people with affordable, high-quality care, the organization helps restore comfort, confidence, and overall health for those most in need.

The Oral Health Outreach Day is open to everyone—FISH clients, island residents, and all island employees alike. This event connects the community with critical resources and services that promote health and wellness.

By partnering with organizations like Project Dentists Care, FISH continues its mission of helping individuals and families access the care and support they need to thrive.

FISH Provides Housing Relief for Senior Resident

For more than 15 years, a Sanibel senior embraced the independence of riding her bicycle everywhere — to the grocery store, library, and post office. Recently, balance issues and back pain turned her daily rides into scary moments. A recent fall across from the FISH Food Pantry, with groceries scattered across the sidewalk, was the breaking point.

“I’ve always been independent, but lately I’m scared every time I get on my bike,” she said. She researched safer options and found a recumbent hand trike that would help with balance and ease her pain. But with her fixed income, buying it meant falling behind on rent.



That’s when FISH stepped in. Through the Helping Hands Rent Assistance program, funded by The Sanctuary Golf Club Foundation, FISH covered two months of her rent. This gave her the ability to redirect funds toward the trike without sacrificing her housing security.

“I’ve been told the benefits of a recumbent trike can help with balance and pain, but they’re so expensive,” she explained. “Because of FISH, I didn’t have to choose between my safety and my home.”

Nitza Lopez, FISH Social Services Director, shared: “Stories like this remind us that even small changes in health or mobility can create big challenges for seniors. By covering rent, we not only helped her stay in her home, but also gave her the confidence to keep moving forward safely.” While she awaits the arrival of her new trike, the senior is grateful for the peace of mind. She can look ahead knowing she will remain both safe on the road and secure in her home.

FISH Staff Attend De-escalation Training

FISH of SanCap's Social Services Director, Nitza Lopez and Senior Services Director, Erika Arnowitz, recently attended a De-escalation Training presented by Dr. Tom Hofmann, PhD, LCSW, LMFT, Director of Adult Behavioral Health Training and Education for Lee Health. The training was hosted by community partner United Way of Lee, Hendry, and Glades Counties at the Community Impact Center.

The session focused on recognizing the signs of rising anxiety and anger, understanding the body's stress response, and applying practical tools to help calm heightened emotions.

Participants learned about using empathy, clear communication, and controlled breathing techniques to engage individuals in distress, emphasizing patience, validation, and safety.



Dr. Hofmann highlighted that while there's no single evidence-based method for de-escalation, success often relies on teamwork, awareness of one's own reactions, and flexibility in responding to others' emotional states. Techniques such as the 2-to-1 breathing method and "pacing and leading" were discussed as effective tools to support emotional regulation and prevent escalation.

The training also introduced the "vagus nerve reset," a simple technique that activates the body's natural calming system—the vagus nerve—which helps slow the heart rate, ease tension, and restore a sense of control.

Erika Arnowitz shared how the training directly connects to FISH's work with older adults. "Our seniors face a range of challenges—emotional, physical, and social—that can lead to moments of frustration or anxiety. This training gave us ways to recognize those cues early and respond in ways that bring calm and reassurance, ensuring our clients feel seen and supported."

Nitza Lopez echoed that the training strengthens the organization's Helping Hands pillar. "At FISH, we meet people at some of their most vulnerable moments. Learning how to de-escalate situations with understanding and confidence helps us create a safe space where every client feels understood and cared for."

Through partnerships like United Way and Lee Health, FISH continues to expand its knowledge and resources to better serve island residents, workforce members, and visitors in need.



FISH Recognizes National Family Caregivers Month



Every November, FISH of SanCap joins the nation in recognizing National Family Caregivers Month — a time to recognize those who provide care and support to loved ones, often around the clock.

Family caregivers help older adults and people with disabilities manage daily routines, medical needs, and emotional well-being. According to the National Council on

Aging (NCOA), across the U.S., more than 53 million people care for a family member or friend — often unpaid — providing an estimated \$470 billion in support each year.

“Caregiving can be both rewarding and exhausting,” said Erika Arnowitz, Senior Services Director at FISH. “Many family members are balancing jobs, children, and their own health while caring for someone they love. At FISH, we remind caregivers they don’t have to do it alone.
